### **Analysis**

#### **Errors**



# Timeouts

The first timeout happened at **47.5 seconds** into the test when the number of concurrent users was at **1582**. Looks like you've been rushing with a timeout of **1000 ms**. Timeouts tend to increase with concurrency if you have lock contention of sorts. You might want to think about in-memory caching using <u>redis</u>, <u>memcached</u> or <u>varnish</u> to return stale data for a period of time and asynchronously refresh this data.


## **Response Times**
